## RIB MOUNTAIN DRIVE PHASE II CONSTRUCTION

**Expect Delays...** Roadway improvements on Rib Mountain Drive from Morning Glory Lane to Cloverland Lane and from Oriole Lane to Robin Lane are underway. Traffic will be reduced to one lane in each direction throughout the summer for replacement of curb and gutter, asphalt pavement resurfacing, new sidewalks, and raised medians.

Temporary traffic signals have been installed at Robin Lane, Cloverland Lane, and Morning Glory Lane to keep the intersections signalized during the installation of new

equipment. Signal upgrades will also occur at North Mountain Road, Starling Avenue, and Parrot Lane.

Aesthetic improvements along the roadway include; new street lighting, burial of overhead utilities, and median areas will be constructed with decorative colored concrete. The project will be complete in October.



## CONNECTIONS PLACE UPDATE

In the last newsletter, the Town introduced the Connections Place, a community center for those age 55 or better with a site location in Rib Mountain. Connections' preliminary plans were to locate north of the Town of Rib Mountain Municipal Center's parking lot. They would share an entrance with the Municipal Center.

The Connections Place is a nonprofit organization dedicated to actively engaging seniors in the Central Wisconsin area. They focus on the exercise, education, and entertainment of their members. Some features they plan to have in their center

include a fitness facility, Zumba, art classes, pot luck dinners, music groups, Medicare education, and even cooking classes!

The group continues to work with the Town and still desires to build on the Rib Mountain Municipal Center site. The Connections Place organizers are currently in a fundraising campaign to help to start the project. Please stay tuned and updates will be provided as they become available.

## BIKE RODEO JULY 27 AT RIB MOUNTAIN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Once again, the Rib Mountain Bike Rodeo will be held in conjunction with the Summer Recreation Program. However, you do not need to be registered for the Summer Recreation Program to participate.

There will be two sessions with the morning session starting at 10:00 am and going to 11:30 am. The afternoon session will be a repeat of the morning and is from 1:30 pm to 3:00 pm. Both sessions will be held at Rib Mountain Elementary School. Please make sure you bring your bicycle and helmet.

The Rodeo will offer bicycle inspections and the opportunity for children to visit several stations to test their bicycle safety skills. Also, does your helmet fit properly? Come find out.

This event is put on through the volunteer efforts of the Rib Mountain Pedestrian & Bicycle Safety Committee. Other participants include Rib Mountain Cycles and Aspirus Safe Kids Coalition.



## CONSIDERING A CONSTRUCTION PROJECT THIS SUMMER?

The Town of Rib Mountain requires homeowners or contractors to obtain a building permit prior to commencement of any construction, electrical or plumbing work. This includes the placement of yard sheds and the installation of fences and decks. Permits are available at the Municipal Center and can also be found on the Town's website under Building & Zoning Applications and Links. ## FIRE PIT AND CAMP FIRE REGULATIONS

The Town of Rib Mountain allows residential fire pits and camp fires provided a few conditions are met. Only clean wood is permitted to be burned. The burning of grass, leaves, and garbage is prohibited. Yard waste should be taken to the Town's Yard Waste Site (6507 South Mountain Road). Further, no burning shall take place when wind velocities exceed 12 miles per hour or during periods of burning bans issued by either the SAFER Fire District or the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. Burning hours are limited to 12:00 PM to 12:00 AM.

Fire pits shall be constructed with non-flammable materials (e.g. bricks, stone, metal) and no greater than 32 inches in diameter. Fire pits or commercially built fire containers are to be located a minimum of 20 feet from any structure and 15 feet from any property line. ## WEED CONTROL

Property owners are required by state law to destroy all noxious weeds on property that they own, occupy or control. Any unsightly growth over 8 inches (except parcels zoned and used for agricultural purposes) is required to be cut by local ordinance.

If the owner fails to destroy such weeds and / or cut grasses over 8 inches after receiving a notice, the Town shall destroy the weeds and / or cut the grasses at the property owner's expense and shall be added to the next tax roll.

## ROADSIDE DITCHES

In an effort to keep storm water flowing, the Town of Rib Mountain Public Works Department prohibits the placement of yard debris such as grass clippings, leaves, or brush along roadways. The debris clogs culverts and can reduce storm water flows. Plugged culverts can lead to flooding and roadside washouts. Please bring these materials to the Yard Waste Site located on CTH N west of Doepke Park.

## YARD WASTE SITE

LOCATION: 6703 South Mountain Road (CTH N)  
 HOURS: Wednesday 1:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. or Dusk  
 Saturday 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

The yard site will be open until Wednesday November 15th unless there is an early snowfall. An attendant is on site to direct you to the appropriate area for leaves, grass clippings, and brush. Please be respectful of the closing times at the yard waste site and allow yourself ample time to drop off your yard waste. The yard waste site does NOT accept tree stumps, construction debris, or any animal/pet waste. Please cover your load when hauling brush and leaves to insure they do not blow onto the roadways.

## UPDATE ON RURAL ADDRESSING

On April 5 Rib Mountain filed legal action seeking to block implementation of the Marathon County Uniform Addressing System. During the summer months, the Town and County will be submitting briefs and responses to the court explaining their position on the County's ordinance and whether the County exceeded their authority. It is anticipated the court will make a decision on the case by early September. ## ROADWAY MAINTENANCE

Maintenance and pavement improvements will be completed throughout the summer including; crack filling on numerous roads and replacement of drainage culverts and ditch grading. Micro-surfacing will be completed on the entire length of Sunbird Lane, Bluejay Lane, Killdeer Lane, northern sections of Quail Avenue, and Pheasant Avenue, and southern section of Falcon Avenue. The Micro-surfacing will occur in July.

An ultra-thin asphalt overlay will be placed on Phlox Lane, Lakeshore Drive from Phlox Lane to Fern Lane, on Fern Lane from Lilac Lane to Lakeshore Drive, Pintail Lane, and portions of Teal Lane. The overlay is a 1-inch thick polymer modified asphalt designed for deteriorated pavements.

# A NEW DOG PARK COMING TO RIB MOUNTAIN

As mentioned in the previous newsletter, Rib Mountain is working in cooperation with Marathon County on a new park. The proposed dog park location is south of CoVantage Credit Union on Oriole Lane. The property is currently owned by Marathon County Highway Department and is a remnant parcel from the CTH R road project. As of the date of this article, Marathon County Infrastructure Committee and Finance Personnel & Property Committee have approved the transfer of land to Rib Mountain. Marathon County Board of Supervisors will be voting on the transfer later this month.

Fundraising efforts have already begun. The Rib Mountain Community Improvement Foundation starting a fundraising campaign this month. 


## SAFER OPEN HOUSE

## 2016 CONSUMER CONFIDENCE REPORT

### Annual Drinking Water Quality Report

The Rib Mountain Sanitary District is pleased to present this year's Annual Water Quality Report. This report is designed to inform you of the quality water and services we deliver every day. **Once again, your drinking water meets or exceeds all Federal and State requirements.** Our constant goal is to provide you with a safe and dependable supply of drinking water. We want you to understand the efforts we make to continually improve the water treatment process and protect our water resources. By testing for over 250 parameters every year, we are committed to ensuring the quality of your drinking water.

### Health Information

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemo-therapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune systems disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Environmental Protection Agency's safe drinking water hotline (800-426-4791).

### Additional Health Information

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. Rib Mountain Sanitary District is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline or at [www.epa.gov/safewater/lead](http://www.epa.gov/safewater/lead).

### Quality Monitoring

All sources of drinking water are subject to potential contamination by constituents that are naturally occurring or are man-made. These constituents can be microbes, organic or inorganic chemicals, or radioactive materials. The Rib Mountain Sanitary District routinely monitors for constituents in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws. The tables on pages 2 and 3 show the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1, 2016 to December 31, 2016.

The Rib Mountain Sanitary District also monitors for unregulated contaminants. Unregulated contaminants are those for which EPA has not established drinking water standards. The purpose of unregulated contaminant monitoring is to assist EPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water and whether future regulation is warranted.

## Our Water Source

Our water is pumped from four wells located along the west bank of the Wisconsin River. Each well is approximately 90 feet deep and produces about 500 gallons per minute. The water is treated with a specialized system to remove some of the iron and manganese. Fluoride is added to help promote healthy teeth and chlorine is added to kill bacteria. The pH is also adjusted to make the water non-corrosive, so it does not damage your water pipes.

## Detected Contaminants

Your water was tested for many contaminants last year. We are allowed to monitor for some contaminants less frequently than once a year. The following tables list only those contaminants which were detected in your water. If a contaminant was detected last year, it will appear in the following tables without a sample date. If the contaminant was not monitored last year, but was detected within the last 5 years, it will appear in the tables below along with the sample date. There was no presence of other contaminants.

## Educational Information

The sources of drinking water, both tap water and bottled water, include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

### Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally- occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which shall provide the same protection for public health.

## Definition of Terms

Term	Definition
AL	Action Level: The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.
Level 1 Assessment	A Level 1 assessment is a study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine, if possible, why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system.
Level 2 Assessment	A Level 2 assessment is a very detailed study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine, if possible, why an E. coli MCL violation has occurred or why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system, or both, on multiple occasions.
MCL	Maximum Contaminant Level: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.
MCLG	Maximum Contaminant Level Goal: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
MFL	million fibers per liter
MRDL	Maximum residual disinfectant level: The highest level of disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.
MRDLG	Maximum residual disinfectant goal: The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

## POSTAL PATRON

### REVALUATION

Starting again this summer, the Town's assessor is going to continue his "walk-through" revaluation of property values which should be completed by December of 2019. Below are a few frequently asked questions about the revaluation project:

**Q:** How will my property value change? Can I contest this change?

**A:** All property will be assessed to fair market value. This means your property value may increase, decrease, or not change at all. If you feel the revaluation of your property is unfair, you can contact the Town Assessor during open book sessions.

**Q:** Why is this being done?

**A:** The last complete or "walk-through" evaluation was conducted over 20 years ago.

**Q:** Will my home be inspected?

**A:** Yes. Interior and exterior inspections of homes will be done as a part of this revaluation. This doesn't mean our assessor will simply barge onto your property. You will be contacted by the assessor to set up an appointment for inspection.

**Q:** How will my property's fair market value be determined?

**A:** Fair market value is determined by factors such as what similar properties to yours are selling for, what your property would cost today to replace, and financial market factors such as interest

rates on mortgages. In short, your local economy determines the fair market value. It is the assessor's job to find what that value exactly is.

**Q:** My home hasn't changed in 20+ years. Why does it need to be revalued?

**A:** Even if your home hasn't changed, your town most likely has. Many outside factors can influence your property value. A change in the quality of schools, a change in crime rates, and access to local services are just a few things that can determine how much your home is valued.

It can safely be predicted no one will ever succeed in making the payments of taxes popular. The best that can be hoped for is that the distribution of tax can be made fair. It is the job of the Town Assessor to ensure assessments are fair and equitable. The State Statutes give the assessor the authority to enter lands as described in Sections 943.13 and 943.15.
